March 16th (Thursday), 7:00 pm. "The Pennsylvania Dutch: 17th Century to Today," a Pennsylvania Humanities Council Program featuring David Valuska, Ph.D., Director of the Pennsylvania German Cultural Heritage Center at Kutztown University. The program will discuss the immigration years from 1683 to 1808 and trace the patterns of groups coming from Germany, France, Switzerland and Austria. The theological differences among the various German religious groups and distinctions between church people and the varying sects - Mennonites, Amish, Brethren, Schwenfelders and Moravians are also program topics. The lecture will also cover Pennsylvania German culture and traditions that endure today. *Please note: this is a requested program date; it must be confirmed by the Humanities Council and the presenter. the Brush as they hold their annual Easter Egg Hunt in Renfrew Park. Admission is open to all and there is no charge.

April 28th (Friday), 7:00 pm. Exhibition Preview for Friends of Renfrew. Join us at the Museum as we preview a special series of works by Waynesboro artist, Robert Morrow. Our changing gallery will be filled with a collection of paintings, most done within the last few years, that cover the architecture and natural beauty of Renfrew Museum and Park. Renfrew is proud to offer this outstanding gallery display as its first exhibition of 2000; what an appropriate way to begin our 25th Anniversary Celebration!

April 29th & 30th (Saturday and Sunday). The Museum opens for the season with our annual Spring Fest Weekend. Take a step back in time as Renfrew turns back the clock to the 19th century. On hand will be dozens of traditional craftspeople demonstrating their techniques and offering their wares. This program includes everything from blacksmiths to sheepshearers! There is no charge for admission and Renfrew Museum will be open for complimentary tours.

May 4th (Thursday), 7:00 pm. "The Pennsylvania German Farmhouse," a Pennsylvania Humanities Council Program featuring Irwin Richman, Ph.D., Professor of American Studies and History, Penn State University, Harrisburg. "Why do German houses often have two front doors?" During this presentation, Irwin Richman will answer this and many other puzzling questions about the distinctive PA German farmhouse. In this slide-illustrated presentation, he explores the continental origin of the unique house forms and traces them as they have been adapted over the years. *Please note: this is a requested program date; it must be confirmed by the Humanities Council and the presenter. Please call ahead for confirmation.

June 1st (Thursday), 7:00 pm. "The Pennsylvania Germans: 'A Persistent Minority'," a Pennsylvania Humanities Council Program featuring John B. Frantz, Ph.D., Associate Professor of History, Penn State University, University Park. Arriving in Pennsylvania as early as 1683, PA Germans came in ever-larger numbers throughout the Colonial Period. Often called "Dutch" - probably because immigration officials mistranslated the word "Deutsche," which really meant "German" - this "persistent minority" has preserved its distinctive culture for over three centuries. John Frantz focuses on the background of German and

Swiss emigration, the settler's development in PA, and the preservation of PA-German culture. *Please note: this is a requested program date; it must be confirmed by the Humanities Council and the presenter. Please call ahead for confirmation. Thank you.





"Renfrew Tidbits" - Collections Inventory Project

Collections Inventory Project: During the last year, Jeffrey Bliemeister, Museum Curator, began working on an inventory of all the objects in the permanent collection. Each object is being recorded and documented with a photograph from Renfrew's digital camera. Do date, approximately 1,000 of the Museum's estimated 4,000 objects have been completed.
