RENFREW WELCOMES THE PA CONSERVATION CORPS

Restoration of the Fahnestock House and Site Improvement Projects
Keep Renfrew's Staff & Board Busy During Winter Season

Renfrew is finally up and running with its Pennsylvania Conservation Corps grant! After several months of delay in finding a crew leader, the Corps hired Mr. Paul Snyder of Chambersburg. Paul joined us at Renfrew this past November. After setting up his office in the Fahnestock House, he concentrated his efforts on recruiting his crew.

Working through the Career-Links office in Chambersburg, Paul identified locations where he could look for prospective crew members. He then created a presentation and did his recruitment.

After a lot of hard work, several possible crew members were located and interviewed. Schedules were worked out and Paul emerged with the beginnings of his crew.

Right now, Matt is enrolled at Penn State Mont Alto, studying Agro-Ecosystems. Matt says that working for Paul is refreshing, because their Crew Leader is "laid back and enjoys teaching."

Matt found out about the PCC through the internet. Like Josh, he hopes to acquire some masonry and construction skills while at Renfrew. Matt is nearing the end of his studies at Mont Alto and plans to transfer to Penn State's main campus this coming fall.

Robert Ensminger, author of the book, *Pennsylvania Barns*, will be featured on February 28th, presenting his specialty - the Morphology of Barns. Dr. Kent Mountford, environmental historian and estuarine ecologist will present Outhouse to In-house (privies) on March 14th. Dr. Sally McMurray, PSU professor of history will close the series with her talk on Farm Buildings and the Landscape.

**Renfrew Institute offers the program, Greener Homes and Gardens - The latest on safe home, lawn and garden pest, and weed control. This program, scheduled for Thursday, April 18th at 7:00 pm in the Visitor's Center, is underwritten in part by Walker and McBride Offices, division of Barley, Snyder, Senft & Cohen. Lana Adams, Franklin County Extension Agent, will offer updated information and methods for the control of pests and weeds using BMPs ("best management practices"). The program is also free to the public.

New Projects Site Sign & New Phone System Installed

Local Friends of Renfrew may have noticed a change in our landscape while driving by on Main Street. In early January, we installed a new site identification sign along Pennsylvania Route 16, near the Park's picnic pavilion.

This sign, designed to be visible when travelling both East and West on Main Street, will serve as a focal point for announcing upcoming Renfrew events. The twosided sign features space for five lines of text and is protected by plexiglass cover. When the weather improves, we have plans to install lighting for nighttime illumination.



We hope Friends of Renfrew, members of the community, and Waynesboro area visitors will find the sign an effective tool for communicating our upcoming events.

New Projects - Continued Museum Doors & Milk House Floor

Renfrew is happy to announce the completion of two important site improvement projects. Museum volunteer, William Shank, constructed replacement doors for the Museum's bulkheads and staff member, Ronald Harbaugh, repayed the brick floor of the Milk House.

Both of the above projects are real "win-win" situations for Renfrew, as they were completed in-house by staff members or at cost by Museum volunteers. In the case of the Milk House, Ron Harbaugh used existing old brick,

saved from the former addition of the Fahnestock House, to repave the main floor.

Unfortunately, we do not have a "before" photo to compare with the image you see to the left. All we have to say is that prior to the completion of this project, the Milk

House floor was in poor overall condition. Now our school groups and other visitors will not have to contend with the distractions of an uneven and unattractive floor. Thank you, Ron, for doing an excellent job on this muchneeded project.

We also wish to acknowledge the work of William Shank, who constructed two sets of matching bulkhead doors for the Museum. Working in his home shop, Bill built the doors from western straight grain cedar. Once completed, they were painted at Renfrew and installed by volunteers and staff. All of us at the Museum and Park appreciate the time and effort Bill put into this important job.

Museum Donations New Artifacts for the Collection

Since our last issue of *der Wetterhahn*, Renfrew received two outstanding items for its permanent collection. We are

pleased to acknowledge receipt of a 19th Century wooden chest or trunk, given by Mr. G. Craig Caba of Enola. Pennsylvania. Mr. Caba has family ties to the Waynesboro area and this is his second gift to Renfrew within the last five years. Craig also serves as one of our Antique Appraisers and the trunk was brought to the Museum on Antique

Appraisal Day, this past November.

The trunk has a local history. It was formerly located at the Snow Hill Cloister or "Nunnery" in Quincy. Mr.Caba purchased the item at the Snow Hill auction in 1998. We are thrilled to add the piece to our collections. Visitors may see the trunk when we reopen in April; it will be displayed as part of our Snow Hill room on the second floor of the Museum.

Our second new artifact was given by Ms. Hermione Brewer, a Friend of Renfrew, from Greencastle. This 18th century crossbow also arrived at Renfrew on the day of our Antique Appraisal. Ms. Brewer brought this unique item to the event to obtain more information about its manufacture and value. She knew it had local history. After speaking with members of our appraisal team, Ms. Brewer then discussed a possible donation with Renfrew's Curator.

Needless to say, we are thrilled to add such an interesting item to our collection. According to our appraisers, the crossbow dates from the mid-18th century and is mostly

original. It features a hand-made arrow or dart, which is stored in the stock. The crossbow will be on display when we open in the spring.


Renfrew Gift Showcase Continues To Grow
