## War of 1812

1812 was a noteworthy date for the Royer family of Waynesboro as well as for the nation as a whole. In that year, Daniel Royer built what is now the Renfrew Museum for his large family; his youngest daughter, Nancy, was born on February 14 of that year. It was also the start of a major U.S. war with Great Britain which would come to be

known as "the second American War for Independence".

At Renfrew both come together in the Museum House kitchen where a cast iron 10-plate stove, made in Mont Alto dates from around 1820. On the body of the stove is a design of a ship with flowers and thistle below.



Above the ship is the phrase "Don't Give Up The Ship". During the War of 1812, these well-known words were spoken by Captain James Lawrence who fought in the 13-minute Battle of Boston Harbor on June 1, 1813. Lawrence died in the battle.

One of the main causes of the War was the impressment of American sailors. Great Britain, involved in a war with Napoleon, would halt ships on the high seas and "impress" or "force" American seamen into its naval service.

Other issues included British restrictions on American trade with France and British military support for native Americans who were opposed to U. S. westward expansion.

The War also had a broad venue with battles taking place

from Maine to the Great Lakes to New Orleans. And, infamously, it came close to ruining the capital city with several buildings burned in Washington, D.C., including



the White House with its well-known story of Dolley Madison saving the portrait of George Washington. Both Senate and House wings of the Capitol were burned "the center where the Capitol Dome rests was not then finished" as well as the U. S. Treasury, and other public buildings.

But during its course, it was a difficult domestic period. "The U. S. Army had to contend with chronic recruitment and desertion problems. The government was short of funds and teetered on the verge of bankruptcy, trade with the enemy was unchecked and growing, domestic opposition remained intractable, and there was ominous talk of secession in New England," according to the authors of "The Rockets' Red Glare". An Illustrated History of the War of 1812," as quoted in The Washington Post.



#### War of 1812

Although this War is often disregarded, now, that "red

glare" gave rise to our national anthem composed by Francis Scott Key while imprisoned on board the British ship, "H.M.S. Surprise," in Baltimore Harbor in September 1814.





The anthem was set to the music of J.S. Smith, "To Anacreon in Heaven". It was adopted as the national anthem by President Woodrow Wilson in 1916 and confirmed by congressional resolution in 1931.

#### **Ouick Facts**

War was declared on June 8, 1812

The last battle was fought in 1815, in New Orleans, two weeks after the Treaty to stop the war was signed.

Francis Scott Key studied law at St. John's College in Annapolis (still in existence).

Key was the attorney for Sam Houston of Texas who was charged for assaulting another Congressman and prosecuted Richard Lawrence for an unsuccessful attempt to assassinate President Andrew Johnson.

Tecumseh, a Shawnee chief, wanted a united Indian nation extending from Michigan to the Gulf of Mexico. He supported the British to gain help for his cause. He died in 1813. His body was never found.

The British Army in Canada received contraband beef from New York and Vermont.



The War of 1812 took place as Napoleon was invading Russia.

During the War, President James Madison lived up to his title as Commander-in-Chief by taking command of an artillery battery.

#### **National Programs**

For some years, Renfrew Museum has participated in two national programs aimed at drawing visitors and providing us with exposure to a wider audience.

The Blue Star program provides free admission to some 1500 museums, such as ours, for active duty military, including Army, Navy,



Air Force, Coast Guard, Marines, National Guard and Reserve members along with five family members.

The active military personnel must have a Geneva Convention common access form (CAC), a DD Form 1173 ID card, or a DD Form 1173-1 ID card to present at time of admission to the Museum.

For Renfrew this is an ideal way to acknowledge the efforts of dedicated service members in defending and protecting our country. If you know of any active duty personnel who might be eligible for this program please let them know. This program operates from Memorial Day to Labor Day.

The other annual event we participate in is the Smithsonian Day which year on Saturday,



September 29, 2012. To obtain a ticket go to the Smithsonian website at www.si.edu. This ticket provides free admission for two persons per household. As a member institution, people may use this ticket for a free tour of Renfrew's Museum House.

#### Changes A' Coming

Renfrew Museum is going through some changes. The most immediate one that volunteers and visitors will notice is the Wagon shed, adjacent to the Visitors Center. This is in preparation for converting that space into a meeting room and media center for educational programs.

With lectures drawing an attendance of 60-70 persons, it has become difficult to seat everyone in the main part of the Visitors Center.

The area has been cleared, the wooden benches removed, and the ground leveled. Next gravel was poured on top and footers installed. In total, this took some fifty-five ten inch blocks, ninety-five eight-inch blocks, and four 75lbs. bags of Type S mortar.

Once this is ready it will be inspected by Washington Township Supervisor Earl Baer.

The area will be backfilled and the stone wall pressure sprayed. Next Jim Mong will lay the concrete slab. Over the summer, the maintenance staff will work on removing the siding.

There is, as yet, no timetable for when this will be ready for use, but it is satisfying to see the work go forward.

#### Happy Birthday, Daniel

This year of 2012 would be the 250th birthday of Daniel Royer, born April 27, 1762, owner of the property which would become Renfrew Museum and Park.

Alone, this is quite a milestone. Add to that the Museum House he built is now 200 years old and it is quite monumental.


A tanner by trade, Mr. Royer also served as the representative from Franklin County in the Pennsylvania Legislature for four years, and was a tax assessor for the Washington Township's first direct tax.

Many times the story has been told of how Royer took a herd of cattle from his home at age fifteen years to the starving troops at Valley Forge. This was quite the trip from Five Forks to Valley Forge, in the abundant snow and cold of that winter.

Young Daniel must have been impressed by George Washington when he had dinner with him. One can only imagine what the conversation would have been.


Royer must have been inspired because he became a Ranger on the Frontier when he served as an Ensign with the 5th Company, 1st Battalion, Cumberland County Militia.

A true entrepreneur, Royer owned and operated not only the tannery, but a gristmill and limestone kiln at the property in Waynesboro. He and his brother bought 2,113 acres in Woodbury Township (Huntington County )now Blair County and erected Cove Forge and built a furnace where his son Samuel was manager. He passed away in 1838 at age 76.

A kitchen garden near the Museum House gives the feeling of 1800's everyday life.







#### In Remembrance

It is with great sadness that we note the passing of three of Renfrew's long-term, dedicated volunteers: Rev. Willard Rahn, Ellie Miller, and Judge John W. Keller. Each in their own way, contributed to making Renfrew the prestigious institution it is today.

Rahn was an important figure in the early years of Renfrew serving in a variety of capacities, dating back to 1982-Park Committee Chairman, Volunteer Guides, Board of Directors from 1978 to 1996 (nonconsecutive) and President of the Board in 1984.

Born and educated in Minnesota, he served in the U.S. Navy, and went on to become a minister in the Presbyterian



After moving to Pennsylvania he served in various locations, moving in 1975 to the Hawley Memorial Presbyterian Church in Blue Ridge Summit and later the Boonsboro United Church of Christ. After retirement he served at Homewood Retirement Center in Williamsport, Md. where he formed a kazoo band and established National Kazoo Day.

He was active in many activities from photography to golf, birding and backpacking.

He passed away on March 9.

Ellie Miller was also a long time volunteer at Renfrew,

her docent career going back to the opening of the Museum. A nurse by training, she married Dr. Joseph Miller and had three children. The couple hosted a number of international exchange students who wished to learn English and experience life in the United States.



During her years at Renfrew she worked in

the Gift Shop, served as coordinator of Museum guides, assisted with the Christmas programs from planning tours to making punch, and volunteered as a docent up until this year.

She passed away on March 16.



Inspired by the example of his forebears, John W. Keller was the third generation of his family to study law.

And his example continued onto the next generation, as his two sons both became lawyers.



Waynesboro High School where he met his future wife, Margaret. He later attended the Dickinson School of Law and began his legal practice working with his father. He served as both Borough attorney for Waynesboro and solicitor for Franklin County before being appointed to the bench. He was active in many local organizations including the Waynesboro Evangelical Lutheran Church, the Waynesboro Chamber of Commerce, and the YMCA. At Renfrew he served for many years as President of the Renfrew Committee, Inc.

He passed away on April 19.



#### **Emma's Carpet**

Visitors to Renfrew's Museum House will find a new rug on the floor of the dining room. Found among the many treasurers from Emma Nicodemus still in storage, was a Sarouk style rug tied



with a classic Persian Senneh Knot.

Sarouks were originally woven in the Arak district of Iran in the last 19th and early 20th centuries. Like most Persian rugs, they are named for the village where they were produced. They are characterized by a central medallion with blue wefts and a short velvet-like pile.

Although there is some controversy over whether the value of a carpet can be measured by the number of knots, the more of them the finer the carpet and some can surpass 600 to the square inch.

What we call oriental or Persian carpets were probably first made by itinerant weavers to provide a cover for the land enclosed by their tents. And Persia, present-day Iran, was one of the most famous rug makers, with weaving traditions going back 1,000 years.
