With the help of others, including her longtime estate caretaker, attorney, bankers, municipal officials, friends and more, she devised a way to make an incredible lasting gift to the community by willing what she named *Renfrew* to the people of Waynesboro as a public museum and park. Her generous bequest, an investment in the future, created a one-of-a-kind historic site, a scenic natural respite set aside for generations yet unborn to discover, learn, enjoy, recharge — and dream.

Emma's dream has been carried forward by countless others who have continued to invest in Renfrew's future. Day in and day out, our staff, board, committees, and volunteers work hard to make the most out of the resources you and others so generously share which enable Renfrew to fulfill its mission to "preserve, enhance, promote, and interpret the Royer family Pennsylvania German Farmstead, the Nicodemus and Bell collections, and the surrounding Park."
