the departure of the old is announced by the 's Neijohr a' winscha un a' schiessa or the "Wishing-in and Shooting-in of the New Year." In its simplest form, the tradition is marked by well-wishers or "shooters" going house to house, presenting their New Year's wishes and firing their longrifles to mark the New Year. Dr. A. R. Horne 's The Pennsylvania German Manual (1910) summarizes the practice. Home, born and reared a Pennsylvania German, learned the "character, habits, virtues, homelife and characteristics of the people thoroughly" and New Year's Day Calling, 1859 informs us that, "Coming of New Year and the departure of the old is announced by shooting. Those shooting go from house to house, present their New Year's wishes and shoot before the door. As we meet each other the first time on New Year we wish each other a Happy New Year. Each one tries to get ahead of the other in wishing."1

An excellent detailed account is provided by Reverend John Baer Stoudt:

The party usually consisted of the wünscher (the reciter), and the shooters, five or six in number. The latter carried guns, usually old war muskets, and fired a volley at the conclusion of the greeting. The party assembled at the home of the leader and at midnight, after having wished well to the head of the house, they set out for the homes of the friends and neighbors. The "Wünschers," as the party was called, upon the arrival at a homestead would arrange themselves at the window of the kammer, where the head of the house slept, or beneath the window of the bed chamber in case he slept up-stairs, and would call him by name. Upon receiving an answer the reciter would begin to repeat the greetings. By this time the whole house was stirring, for everybody was anxious to hear the Wünschering and to witness the shooting. If the shooting was not agreeable to the family it was not indulged in, for permission always was asked before the volley was fired. Those to whom the salutations were conveyed usually recognized their indebtedness to the kind purveyors, by inviting them into the house to a warm stove and by "handing around" refreshments. Sometimes hot mince pies and brandy or rum were added to the customary cakes, apples and cider. After the luncheon the party wended their way, ofttimes through storm and snow, to the next farm house. To have been passed by the Wünsching party, was a mark of unpopularity and accepted by the family as an affront.2

A scene such as this would have been commonplace during the residency of the Royer and Fahnestock families in the early nineteenth century. In an era when the observance of Christmas was mostly a religious one, the more secular celebration of New Year's Day calling was practiced by the multiple ethnic groups which had settled Franklin and Adams counties including the Pennsylvania-Dutch, English, and Scotch-Irish.³ We here at Renfrew Museum and Park hope that you come calling and visit with us this season as we celebrate our 47th year in 2022! HAPPY NEW YEAR!


John Frantz, Supervisor of Buildings and Grounds



Retiring at the end of the 2021 season, John Frantz served Renfrew Museum and Park for just over 25 years as Supervisor of Buildings and Grounds. John has been a life-long resident of Waynesboro, growing up on the family farm along Buchanan Trail / PA 16. A product of the Waynesboro Area School District, John was active in 4H and Future Farmers of America (FFA) during his high school years. After graduation, he worked on the family farm and at various local feed mills. For four years he had the opportunity to travel with the Schlitz 40 horse hitch and the O's

Gold 40 horse hitch, both based in Zearing, Iowa. Prior to working at Renfrew, he was employed at the former Grove Technical Retreat Center in the grounds department.

John's wife of 43 years, Jean, recalls fondly how he came to take on the position of Supervisor of Buildings & Grounds at Renfrew. She recounts that when she and their children were



on a walk at the park one day, they ran into Renfrew's original caretaker, Ed Miller (1929-2017) who mentioned to Jean that he would be retiring soon and that Renfrew would be looking to hire his replacement. Upon returning home, Jean told her husband has served faithfully ever since.

During his tenue with Renfrew, John lead the maintenance staff in daily care and stewardship of the 107-acre property, ensuring the historic buildings, trails, and natural features were always well-kept and ready to receive our many visitors. Along with his regular duties, John also lent his hand at educating and interpreting for the public. John's extensive



knowledge of historic farming techniques and technology, along with that of his family, were called upon often for special events at Renfrew including wheat threshing demonstrations, presentations and exhibits on the Conestoga Wagon Company, "Meet the Mares" program, hay rides, and more. Renfrew is eternally grateful to John and the entire Frantz Family for over a quarter century of devoted service to this organization. 
