# NEW EXHIBITS FOR SEPTEMBER

Planned for September 10 through October is a new exhibit installation highlighting the outstanding hooked rug collection at Renfrew. It is titled: "The Hooked Rug as Folk Art." The exhibit will be in the upstairs gallery. Plan to attend the exhibit opening on September 10 from 4 to 6 p.m. No formal invitation will be sent this time. (Note that the "Flowers!" exhibit will be closed and dismantled the first week in September. Better hurry and see it!)

### FOLK ART

There is quite a bit of confusion and some controversy in defining folk art. Often the term is used to describe furniture, pottery, carvings, paintings, and almost everything in the relm of material culture.

Probably the most accepted definition of folk art is that it was (or is) the product of a self-taught or niave artist or craftsman. Crudeness is often associated with folk art. The quality of the folk piece, be it pottery, furniture, painting, etc., does not enter into the definition. Hence a poorly designed or constructed chest of drawers by a trained cabinetmaker is not a folk piece. It is just a poorly made chest of drawers—nothing more.

The folk art aspect of hooked rugs is contained in the decoration or design and not the technique of hooking. Most home made hooked rugs contain designs created by untrained artisians, usually by a female member of a family. So, hooked rugs often fall into the relm of true folk art.

As with all forms of artistic expression, sometimes the end product is charming and delightful and sometimes not. The sampling of rugs in the exhibit will contain examples that range from delightful to the ordinary. Why not attend the exhibit opening and engage in a lively discussion of folk art with the curator/consultant.

#### CURATOR/CONSULTANT

Speaking of the Curator/Consultant (Jim Koenig), he is attending the Summer Institute at the Winterthur Museum. The Institute WINTERTHUR is an intensive

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three week course on the American decorative arts from 1640 to 1830. About 20 people a year are permitted to attend the Institute. All the lectures and demonstrations are given at the Museum.

#### WHAT ELSE IS NEW?

Renfrew recently acquired three pieces of John Bell pottery -- a cider mug (brown glaze); a butter tub; and a small crock with an unusual blue decoration -- not the standard Bell rose.

## BY THE WAY....

Some people have undoubtedly noticed the Museum's collection of Bell pottery is no longer in the gallery. Due to the new exhibits program, the once well lighted pottery is now in a dimly lit corner of the maple bedroom' Sorry! Every effort will be made to assist visitors who are especially interested in Bell pottery.

Before moving the pottery, each piece was individually photographed in color. The photographic record is available (at the Museum) to anyone wishing to see the entire collection of Bell pottery.

#### ANYTHING ELSE?

Yes, one last item. There will be an informal seminar at the Museum loosely titled: "Ways to Identify Antiques for the Beginner."

This seminar will cover a variety of antiques from furniture to glass. Tricks of the trade will be divulged! The seminar is for the beginner, but seasoned veterans may learn something too!
