# <u>Current Museum Special Exhibit: An Exhibit Of Early American Children's Books--July 1 to October 1, 1982 in the Renfrew Museum Gallery</u>

Early American Children's Books are the focus of a new exhibit at the Renfrew Museum. Loaned from the collection of Michael Schnebly of Greencastle, PA the display comprises a varied selection of nearly 100 books printed in the United States before 1840. Particular attention has been placed in choosing books for the exhibit from the presses of small provincial printers as well as those from larger cities to show the progress of children's book publishing from the colonial period onward. #### FOCUS ON: Michael Schnebly

Renfrew's new Exhibit is part of an impressive collection of over 800 American books, magazines, and periodicals (most printed before 1860) from the collection of Michael Schnebly. A local resident, born in Waynesboro and now residing in Greencastle, Mr. Schnebly is a Library Media Specialist with the Washington County Board of Education in Hagerstown, MD. He graduated from Greencastle High and went to pursue Library Science at Shippensburg State College. He began collecting early children's books while still in Grade School, after becoming fascinated with the lovely illustrations that fill many of the early volumes. He still loves illustrated books, and has collected many examples of beautiful woodcuts, several with delicate hand coloring. His grade school interest in children's literature turned into a life-long study of a very unique and often overlooked aspect of American culture. From his initial interest in books for their illustrations, Mr. Schnebly began to focus on acquiring first editions by such famous authors as Nathaniel Hawthorne, Louisa May Alcott, Horatio Alger, Mark Twain, and Martha Finley amassing an enviable assortment of rare editions. He has now turned to books printed before 1840 particularly examples of books produced in limited numbers by little known publishers. He has several books which are

distinguished as being unique surviving copies (the only copy documented to exist or one of only a few). Collecting rare and first edition books is not an easy task, particularly when limiting the collecting period to American Books before 1860. Books were expensive in America and usually printed in rather small numbers by today's publishing standards. Although

the "chapbooks" (cheap, poor quality books sold by street merchants) were sold for 1 or 2 cents, a Gift Annual could cost about \$1.00, or the price of a common side chair. Not easily affordable to the average citizen. Couple that fact with the natural abuse that would be inevitable in the hands of any youngster and it becomes obvious that finding ANY early children's book is an accomplishment. Mr. Schnebly long ago abandoned the idea of collecting just to amass a large number of books, but has worked on finding rare editions, reprints and unique examples of sometimes rather unknown books (that is, unknown to us-many of the books were probably well known and popular when they were printed. results from the collection is a fascinating look at the lives, customs, pastimes, morals, and beliefs of early Americans. charming woodcuts illustrate typical clothing and home furnishings of the period, and the stories, poems, and fables tell so much about how early Americans thought about themselves.

We wish to thank Mr. Schnebly for bringing this rare collection into the public eye and for sharing his time and knowledge with us. Mr. Schnebly has written an Annotated Checklist of the exhibit which
